Interventions: Precision Teaching



Why have I been given this leaflet?

Sometimes children may need extra help with their learning. This information has been produced for parents and carers of children who have additional learning needs. The leaflet has information about the extra help or intervention which has been chosen to help your child. This leaflet is about '**Precision Teaching**' interventions.

The Graduated Approach

Teachers continually assess, plan, apply and review the way they teach all pupils in their class. When a pupil has an additional learning need identified, the approach to teaching gradually becomes more personalised. Children needing extra help may then receive a 'targeted' intervention over time or it may be decided that a more 'specialist' approach is needed.


Precision Teaching

What is an intervention?

- These are additional teaching sessions which run alongside usual classroom teaching. This may be delivered in a small group or sometimes in a 1:1 session.
- The SENCO or specialist teacher will have assessed your child's individual needs and may decide that they need to teach in a different way. This is sometimes called 'targeted' or 'specialist' provision depending on the teaching method used.
- The school will be very clear about why they are doing this, how long it will run for and will agree the expected outcomes.

What is Precision Teaching?

- Precision Teaching is an intervention programme for pupils who are struggling with either reading, spelling or maths.
- Each day, pupils will engage in a short, focused and fun teaching session based on developing a specific skill. This is followed by a one minute test. They will record their progress on a chart which highlights success and promotes motivation.
- This method can help pupils to acquire vocabulary or skills through a direct teaching approach so they can apply their learning when back in the classroom.



How is it different from my child's usual teaching?

- Precision Teaching is a carefully planned programme to support pupils who have difficulties remembering facts and key information.
- It is very repetitive. This provides lots of opportunities to learn things over and over again which some pupils benefit from. It is delivered in a pacy and lively way. Pupils are given lots of praise to encourage them.
- It is completed daily through a 10 minute 1:1 session with a trained adult.

How can I help?

- Your child will benefit from 'overlearning' things. Check which skills your child is learning so that you can practise with them at home.
- School will let you know when the intervention will start, how long it's planned to run and will keep you updated on progress.
- Do attend any meetings that are arranged to talk about this but also check in regularly with the teacher to share information about the learning.
